As a school we visit three such locations regularly. This task is to choose one of those places or one of your own and create a group of photographs to show different aspects of the place. Maddy has already produced one for Gwithian beach and you can look at it on the Outdoor Learning display for ideas. It can be a big area, I am going to try and make one for the Lake District, or just a patch of wildness in your garden. Happy snapping.</p>	<p>Recycle and reuse.</p> <p>It is good to put rubbish that can be recycled in special bags rather than in the general waste bin but it can be even better to recycle and/or reuse things yourself. You can turn old boxes into musical instruments, old plastic containers into toys or bird feeders. There are hundreds of ideas on the internet – what is the most creative way you can turn waste into a new product.</p>	<p>Change the world.</p> <p>During this unit we will be thinking about all the ways humans can damage the world they live in and also how we can make a positive difference with the right actions. Choose one element e.g. electricity saving, driving less, recycling and create a poster to make people start acting differently.</p>
