Every child was focused and the progress in the lesson was clearly visible with a rich range of problem solving activities, stretching all children at their level. I spoke to some very gifted mathematicians who had kept problems in their books from days previous because they were determined to crack them. Meanwhile, those that find perimeter and area a difficult concept to grasp (I was one of those) were being brilliantly scaffolded with resources that give visual representations and manipulatives to engage with. Add some brilliant exposition from Mrs Haddy and some probing questioning from Mr Eyriey and you had a close to perfect lesson.

I'm not sure I was quite so perfect in Kynance Class on Tuesday but I certainly enjoyed my time covering there. I was particularly impressed with some of the writing that they produced and the information sentences that they wrote about teeth showed that they had a good understanding of the Science they have been studying too. They are now going to start writing information texts about real life superheroes following on from visits from the police and a paramedic (unfortunately Covid restrictions stopped a planned visit from the firemen). They might get to do a further writing piece in the form of a persuasive advert for the seed bombs that they made yesterday for their creative enterprise project and I hope some of you will be able to support them by buying one when they are sold in the virtual Christmas Fayre.

Finally, Poldhu Class are also getting ready to write and have been using a storymap of the Scarecrow's wedding to rehearse the story so that they can do so confidently. The storymap is posted on the school website under the Polhu Class tab so have a look and see if you can learn the story together. The class along with Kynance will soon be starring in one of the most famous of stories and their will soon be requests for costumes. In the meantime, we are trying to wade through the range of conflicting advice on singing in schools so that the older children are able to provide the usual accompaniment. A sign of the strange times we live in but their does look like a light at the end of the tunnel and we have just heard that Cornwall is one of the few regions in tier 1 so that together with the good weather forecast for the weekend gives us much to be positive about.
