Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

Do not worry if you have not submitted anything for the book yet – in a way it is better that you really take some time over it so that you can create your very best work. Remember, that it is OK to ask parents to help you especially when it comes to thinking of good descriptive vocabulary. Also remember, that work can be handwritten or typed and if you have lots to write parents can help type too. There is plenty of space in the book so pieces can be up to 4 sides of handwritten A4 or two pages of typed but obviously if you are writing a poem for instance it might be quite a bit shorter. You are also able to submit one illustration to go with your work but be aware that it will be shrunk down to go in the book so try and make it a simple clear design that will still good to view if shrunk to about 50cm2.
