Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

I often seem to open and close this newsletter in traditional English style by commenting on the weather and this week there is good reason to do so. Because of the weather we did not manage to run Outdoor School but Rinsey did get out today to two very different experiences. Half of the class were involved in a gymnastics competition with some excellent performances from all taking part and a few placed individuals too. Meanwhile the other half of the class travelled to Carnon Downs to visit the Islamic Centre where they were greeted by two Imams. The children enjoyed learning all about Islamic prayers which they sang in Arabic and how to write their name in Arabic too. It was a wonderful opportunity for children to get to see another faith first hand and one that we have found difficult to find in Cornwall previously as the county has much fewer places of worship to visit than the rest of the country for religions other than Christianity.
