Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

A grey week in many ways and it's at times like these that it's hard to keep the spirits high. Fortunately, we work in the best profession for combatting the lows because the children can brighten up any day and require so much attention that there is little room for introspection. Their enthusiasm is infectious and all teachers love feeding this and watching the resulting energy explode into a frenzy of activity, we just need to ensure it is directed at the intended learning. This week I have had the pleasure of spending some time in Kynance observing both Mrs Eustice and Mrs Backhouse teaching and what a team they make; the organisation in the class is fastidious and the children were moved seamlessly through learning experiences to develop mathematical reasoning. The new addition of Mrs Jones to the team certainly helped the well-oiled machine do its work and I was left in no doubt that they are in safe and capable hands.

Next week I will spend some time with both Godrevy Class and Rinsey – again with a focus on mathematics. However, although this is my focus for looking at the schools provision this term children in all classes are certainly not being sold short of opportunities to develop in the wider curriculum. In Godrevy they continue to develop their culinary skills and this week demonstrated that we can manage to some extent without Mrs Sicolo's expertise – the week's focus on the USA meant that the menu of burgers and pancakes did not present too much of a challenge but, judging by the relish with which they were devoured, they were successful. They are also developing many ICT skills as they have decided to forgo the usual outcome of a recipe book this time and are instead developing a blog that you will soon all be able to view.

Rinsey meanwhile, continue to develop their DT skills and took things to the next level this week with the use of a cam shaft to create a moving toy. Their topic of 'Machines – Friend or Foe' continues to also inspire some creative writing; this week concentrating on persuasion to buy various forms of AI devices. I have no doubt though that they are being prepared for the high expectations of Y5/6 maths – I have already seen some excellent work using bar models to understand the complex topic of fractions and I am looking forward to going in next week when I believe they will be starting to investigate perimeter and area.

Finally, our youngest children in Poldhu have continued to learn about different celebrations around the world and this week focused on the Hindu festival of Diwali. The story of Diwali is full of many a magical character to spark children's imagination although one or two were a little worried about the reality of the 10 headed evil King Ravana. The festival also inspired some creative work making Rangoli patterns with rice as has another story: The Scarecrow's Wedding which led to the class designing wedding dresses and suits as well as writing some excellent invitations.

Of course, the celebration that they have yet to focus on will soon be upon us all and although we might be waiting for another week before we start to fully embrace the festive season, there are preparations underway with nativity scripts being evaluated and ideas being discussed on how we will be able to share it with you virtually. Classes are also beginning to make the products that will be sold in the virtual Christmas Fayre – a catalogue will soon be available so that you are able to place orders and Classes will then know how many items they need to produce. 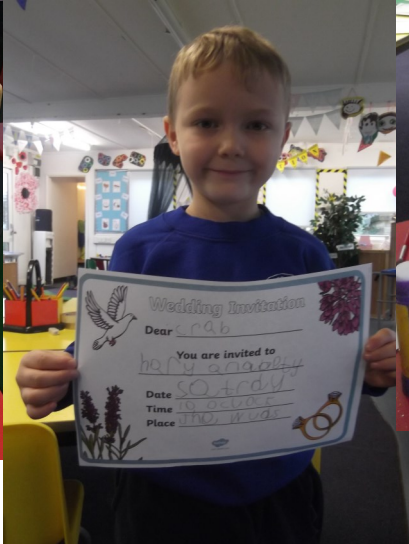
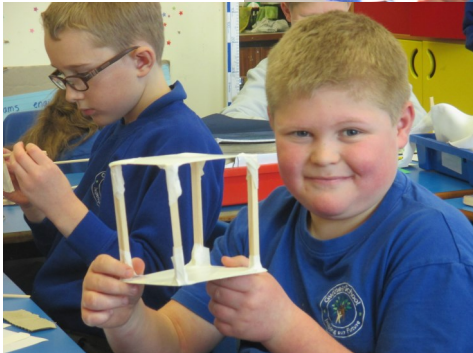
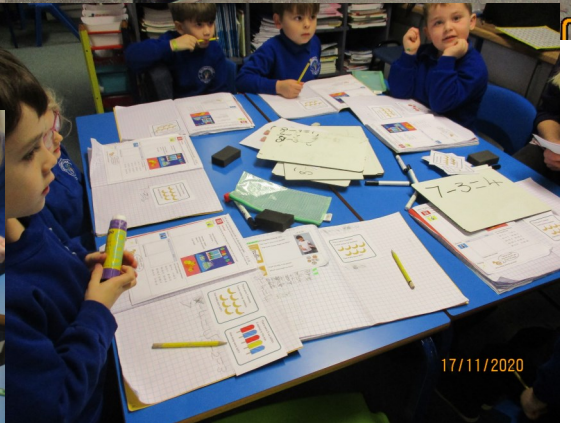
