Dear parents and carers and children,

First of all, apologies for the confusion and mixed messages regarding sports day and for those of you that for some reason did not receive text messages. There was a misunderstanding between us that sports day was to be cancelled when Mr Eyriey and Mr Buckley had actually just re-amended the format so there was no need for different classes to be in close proximity. As for the reliability of communication methods we are looking into different apps etc. that other schools are using to see if they are more effective than ours — in the meantime thank you for your patience. The good news is that as I write I can see the whole school engaged in a pre-race warm up (separated in class bubbles) and all the children, and most adults, seem to be having a great time. It is a shame we have not been able to invite you on this occasion and that the planned PTFA events have had to be put on hold; we want to be a real 'community school' but I am sure you can all understand that in the current climate it would be seen as reckless to carry on regardless. I am no expert but one would hope that with so many now vaccinated, and with an increasing number of people having acquired resistance from having had the virus, that the waves will diminish in time. Again, thank you for your patience and understanding and for the responsible attitude so many of you have taken to get PCR tests when necessary and wait for the results to keep our community safe; we know this often entails sacrifices and possibly missed income but it is greatly appreciated.

The biggest relief for us all in school is that the children seem largely emotionally unaffected – some have had family members contract the virus and seen that for most children the symptoms are not as bad as feared and for others they have just adapted to the 'new norm'. Most importantly though there is a feeling of strength in being together and whether it is a product of being apart for so long I am not sure but I have really noticed how much children are looking out for each other since we have returned. That is not to say that there are not upsets and bad days for some - the 'black dog' can come to any of us but there are safety nets in place to provide support. We have our own superhero pastoral lead/learning mentor, Mrs Tate to help children who are struggling with any personal, social and/or emotional issues and all staff fully subscribe to the ethos that a child needs to feel emotionally secure to be able to learn and prosper. We also have specially selected 'Gwinear Guardians' that look out for acts of kindness during the week and then award the person they have noticed in Friday's celebration assembly and it is always one of the highlights of my week. Finally, our PSHE/SMSC (Personal Social Health Education/Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural development) curriculum is as important to us as any subject. Both Poldhu and Kynance classes have used the fantastic book 'The Worrysaurus' to explore issues associated with anxieties in PSHE lessons this week whilst in assembly I spoke to how we overcome barriers. Mrs Eustice's assembly explored a virtue linked to the theme – this week was how teamwork can help us overcome barriers using various animals as inspiration. Meanwhile, Mrs Gilroy's assembly always uses a news story to follow up on what we have spoken about; this week's story was of how a group of young black children set up a business, creating dolls that better reflected their cultural identity.

If you wish to get involved with this aspect of your child's education remember there are always four optional homework tasks linked to it on the homework sheets that are on the website under Classes tab. You can also see the headlines for the coming weeks PSHE theme at the bottom of this and all other newsletters – this is what I discuss in my assembly. The virtue that Mrs Eustice will present is also there and the words of wisdom are included for you to discuss at home should you wish - you will be amazed at the depth of philosophical thinking that children are capable of. Not much room left to detail what classes have been learning in the rest of the curriculum this week but as always there have been many engaging experiences: Rinsey heading to the museum at Porthcurno to inspire their diary writing by looking at real examples from the war, Godrevy writing gruesome witch's spells based on their creations at Crenver Grove last week, Kynance have been equally inspired by recent visits to Crenver and Trevaskis and continue to explore seasonal changes in science. Finally, Poldhu have been using the fantastic grounds we are blessed with to explore their senses on sensory walks. There will soon be some Fairy Houses to discover on a walk around our wild border (created by last year's Rinsey Class) and the Green Man has finally been put in-situ (pictures to be in next week's newsletter after Potter Craig Underhill returns to see the creation he and Mrs Haddy inspired the children to make). As I said earlier, we hope to invite you in soon to come and see all that is fantastic about the school - hopefully we will be able to go ahead with open days - dates on p3. Until then you will have to take my word for it and I will finish with a big thank you to the fantastic team that make it so including the welcome return of Miss Austin and our fantastically versatile new member of staff Mrs McCotter who works across two classes through the week and then has to fill Mrs B's shoes come Friday! The day has not turned out as bright as we hoped but it hasn't stopped sports day being a success and if the mizzle continues I hope it won't stop you having a great weekend.
