Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

Our Climate Change Action Group are travelling with Mrs. B and some parents to take to the streets with other schools and make their voices heard to try and persuade the powers that be to do more in the quest to reduce emissions and tackle climate change. A group of parents met yesterday and created a wonderful banner to lead their march and the event has certainly inspired others in the school with Godrevy Class spending the morning writing protest posters and wanting to carry out their own march through Reawla. The school is part of the Penwith Education Trust and all schools within this cooperative trust, after consultation from governing bodies, have agreed to support such action and I do believe the momentum is building to such proportions that it will actually result in change on a national and global level. We can but hope and whilst our headline for this week was: 'Setting a realistic goal', we should also never stop dreaming and believing that the world we hand over to our children can be a better one than the one we are currently part of.

According to the met office today sees the last of the blue-sky days for a while but the rain looks like it will remain on hold until later on Saturday so enjoy the dry while it lasts or better still learn to love the rain (if you haven't already) as there looks like being plenty of showers next week. As I sign off I have just seen the rest of the school walk out through the gates (safely escorted by adults in high vis jackets) with placards and protest leaflets to take the message to Reawla so you may well have seen them by the time you get this. Viva La Revolucion and as our banner in Penzance says: "Be part of the solution not the pollution!"
