Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

We ended last week with a slightly muddy walk – if we had left it till this week we would probably have needed crampons rather than wellies. Soon there will be one more enhancement to the outdoor area for children to explore and we are hoping that some of you may be able to help create it: Beside the amphitheatre Mr Lester has built a framework for our Outdoor Music station based on ideas from Rinsey who submitted some brilliant extensive designs. He is now going to add as many of the sound making artefacts that children included in these designs and as a cost saving measure we thought we would see if any of you had some of these lying around the house, in the never entered store cupboard or the loft. The list is on this newsletter on the dates page and we would appreciate any donations; obviously if we get lots of the same thing we will only use so many in the build but will probably keep others for spares in case we have some over enthusiastic percussionists! Hopefully when it is complete it will be well used and the idea of siting it next to the amphitheatre is so that performances can be accompanied with sound effects. We will add it to the virtual tour map of the school which is now on the school website if you haven't had chance to see it.

Kynance have also been busy in class with more learning linked to their topic of superheroes and they have had a scientific focus this week; thinking about how a superhero can stay healthy. 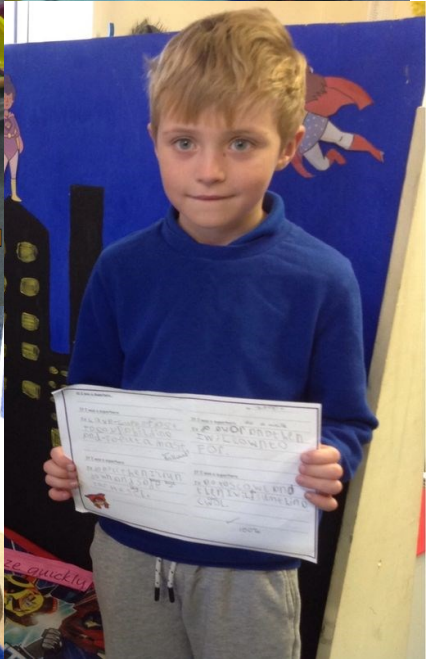

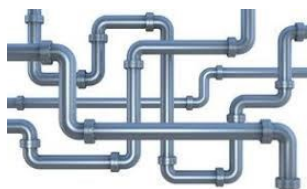
