Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

Didn't time fly by – literally for me on the slopes but I am sure we would all of liked another week and the 6 o clock start on Monday did come as a bit of a shock to the system. I hope you all had a wonderful break over the festive period, that no one was on Santa's naughty list and that you all got what you wanted or even better what you didn't realise you wanted but you now love. Judging by the behaviour we have witnessed during this first week back, nobody deserved to be on a naughty list and I have been really pleased with the levels of engagement visible in all classes.

As usual classes have been themed around the topics being covered which was particularly impressive in Kynance and Godrevy as they managed to theme alongside switching classrooms. Kynance's walls look like something out of a futuristic comic book to support their Superhero topic whilst Godrevy have turned the clock back a hundred years in the other direction with a nearly life size Sopworth Camel hanging from the ceiling above the bow of the Titanic, an upturned tank and a curtain draped stage on which to perform the Charleston.

Next week clubs start again and as always we have attempted to provide a KS1 and KS2 club for each day although due to training commitments there are a few days when certain clubs have to be suspended for the week – check the dates page in this newsletter. Dates for outcomes and for our open day will be published in next week's newsletter. Do keep checking the dates page as occasionally there are changes made due to unforeseeable circumstances although we will also text when such changes are made. One date rapidly approaching is the Youth Speaks competition on the 18th next Friday; we have two teams taking part at Hayle Day Care Centre next week and both have created excellent presentations that are well worth watching if you have the time.

With the weather staying firmly in the realms of winter can you also make sure children always have warm coats in school as well as being needed at break and lunchtimes the cold doesn't stop us taking learning outdoors. In fact, only yesterday Godrevy Class were at the beach, from which they take their name, learning about fractions and collecting stones for the games they will be making. Wellies or other outdoor shoes for Outdoor School do not need to be kept in school as you will always be sent a text if a class is going out but have a pair at the ready. However, do make sure children have their PE kit in school as classes usually have two hours of PE every week and we have generally found that it is better if children keep the kit in school and don't use it for clubs.

I feel there is still the real bite of winter to come but after the slight hiccup with our heating at the start of the week the old building is insulating us nicely and there is certainly no lack of warmth for the spirit in the building.
