Dear Parents, Carers and Children,

As part of Science Day Miss Shaw and Mrs Sicolo were guiding children on an exploration into the fascinating facts involved in the production of honey by bees. In the hall myself and Mr Buckley helped children better understand that gasses are made of molecules and that these can be used to power some of the world's most powerful machines as well as their not so powerful but entertaining balloon propelled rockets. Children with Mrs Lynes, Mrs Tate and Mrs Barber meanwhile, were discovering what makes a healthy lifestyle and learning about human anatomy by making their own Pizza People. However, none of us could compete with Class 2 for the 'Wow Factor'; children had great fun exploring the properties of different liquids whilst making bubbles with Miss Austin and Mrs McKie but were then given a fantastic demonstration of the amazing properties. 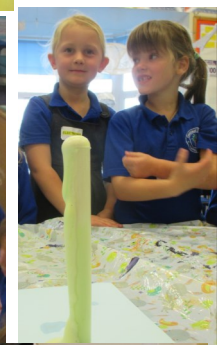
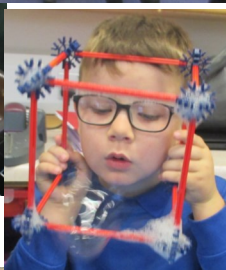
