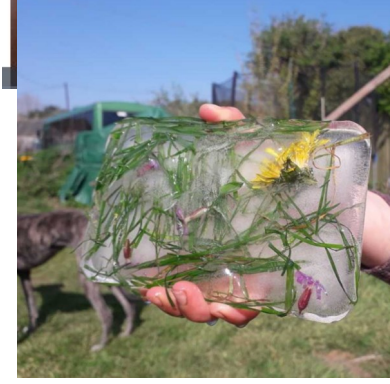
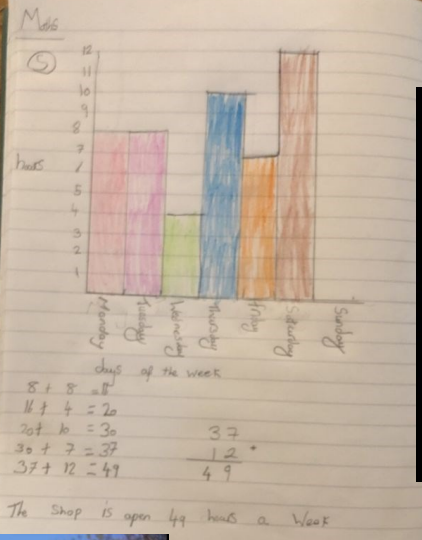
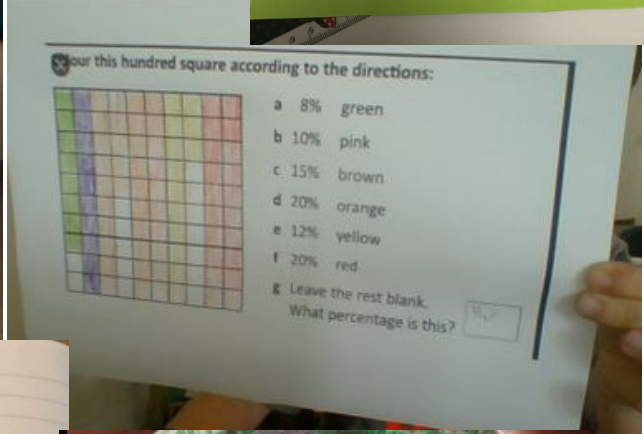
Stig of the Dump by Clive King
