Each house has a little door so that messages can be left for the fairies so hopefully it will inspire a little writing too as it did for Kynance when they visited them yesterday afternoon. On the way round Poldhu will also see the new 'Green Man' sculpture, again created by last year's Rinsey Class under the guidance of local potter Craig Underhill and our own artist in residence, Mrs Haddy. Craig came in to view the finished article, creatively mounted by Mr Lester, and was delighted with the result which brings me to a final invitation:

As I have said before we are extremely sorry to have had to cancel so many planned events that would have welcomed you as parents into school.
